English

The children completed and published their non-chronological reports. Learning included peer assessing, where the children read and commented on a partner's writing. The children used an assessment sheet to specifically identify features of the writing, which was to include: an introduction sentence; supporting sentences; a closing sentence; Prof KIA statements; contrasting conjunctions e.g. but, however)

Maths


In maths the children have engaged in practical as well as written activities learning about money. To help them understand that money can be represented in different ways but still have the same value, they

- used manipulatives to show all the coins that exist in the English currency
- made amounts in different ways to help them understand how to use the coins
- recorded money using £ and p
- added coin values together to find a total amount

Here is a money-converting machine.

Money in pence goes in the top and comes out in pounds and pence.

Insert pence



- If 147 p went in, what would come out?
- If £9 and 62 p came out, what went in?

In science the children were exploring magnets and we investigated which metals are magnetic.

Maths

Continue learning the 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10 times tables in sequence and randomly.

1. Create a money grid like the one below. Ask an adult or older sibling to record an amount in pound and pence. Draw the amount using the fewest coins. If available, ask your adult whether you can use real coins.
2. Practice adding different amounts and record either in pence only or £ and p. E.g. $47p + 86p = 133p = \text{£}1.33$
