- 2 subjects are teacher assessed: Writing and Science





Applying for secondary school

- Application for secondary schools takes place in the beginning half of the Autumn term – it is something you should be starting to think about now if you have not already.
- The application is made online.
- You and your child have a choice about which school they will attend but it is also very important that you are realistic when making the application.
- Children at Kilmorie move on to a wide variety of excellent schools both in and outside of Lewisham.
- This is an exciting time but can also cause anxiety. It is important that you are prepared, take your time and discuss the process with your child to reduce any worries they may have.

Applying for secondary school: How to apply

- Applications for secondary school places can only be made online at <u>www.eadmissions.org.uk</u>
- At the start of the application you will be asked for your postcode; this will identify which borough you live in and ensure your form is sent electronically to that local authority when you submit it.
- If you applied electronically for your child's reception place, you will use the same login information to apply for a secondary place.
- You can start to apply once the website opens on 1st September 2023
- You can save your application as you go along and amend it; once submitted it cannot be changed. You will receive an automated email confirming receipt and a list of the schools you have applied for.
- If you submit your application before the deadline, it will not be processed until after the closing date with everyone else.

Some schools need extra information from you when you apply. For September 2024 admission, you need to complete a supplementary information form if you are applying for:

- Bonus Pastor Catholic School faith applicants
- Haberdashers' Aske's Hatcham College music places (application by mid-September)
- <u>Prendergast School</u> music places (application by mid-September)
- ► St Matthew Academy faith applicants
- <u>Tripity Church of England School, Lewisham</u> faith applicants (also has open places ovailable)

You can get supplementary information forms directly from the school. You can also download a form from the school's website and return it directly to the school by 31 October 2023.

If a school requires a supplementary information form and does not receive it, your application will **NOT** be considered.

Applying for secondary school: the Process

- Discuss your ideas as a family.
- Spend time familiarising yourself with the council's website: https://www.lewisham.gov.uk/secondaryadmissions
- Think about what types of school would best suit your child (E.g. Academy, Community, Free, Foundation, Faith)
- Obtain information about schools in other boroughs by visiting their websites.
- List possible schools; be realistic with reference to the admissions criteria, especially thinking about how far away you are by foot (walking distance).
- Obtain school's prospectus; visit schools.
- Gather any supporting evidence that may be required e.g. a letter from a church leader for a faith school, doctor's letter for a medical need or social worker's letter.
- Make your informed choices and complete the application form(s) online; preferably by Friday 20th October 2023 or at the very latest Tuesday 31st October.

Visiting Prospective schools

- ► It is **vital** you and your child visit the school don't go on other people's opinions or what you have heard.
- Make a schedule so you are not trying to visit all schools in the same week (some open day dates are already on school's websites and some need to be booked).
- Make a checklist of things that are important to you before you go.
- Outline questions you want to ask when you visit.
- Inform Kilmorie when you are out visiting a secondary school for attendance purposes.






Sample Itinerary
