

- To find out ways to support your children in their learning

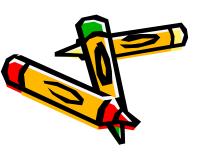




What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

It is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of Reception.

It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.





The key ways young children learn

- Playing
- Being with other people
- Being active
- Exploring new things and experiences
- Talking to themselves and others
- Communicating about what they are doing with someone who responds to their ideas
- Representing ideas and experiences
- Meeting physical and mental challenges
- Being shown how to do things
- Practising, repeating, applying skills
- Having fun



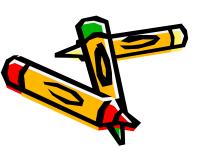


Role of the adults

Playing and exploring - engagement


Active learning - motivation

- Persevering Parrot



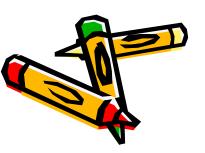
We acknowledge these qualities as and when we see them and talk about them regularly in class. We encourage parents and carers to do the same.





The 3 Prime Areas

These three areas of the early years curriculum underpin all the other learning that your child experiences.






Communication and Language

The children will be learning to:

- develop their listening and concentration skills
- express themselves effectively through conversations, story telling and role play
- develop their understanding of language, with a particular focus on vocabulary







<u>Personal, Social and Emotional</u> <u>Development</u>

The children will be learning to:

- become self-confident
- have awareness of their own feelings and feelings of others and find ways to manage these
- find positive ways to resolve issues
- make healthy choices around food and hygiene, including oral hygiene



Physical Development


The children will be learning to manage their bodies through:

Gross Motor skills:

- moving confidently in large spaces
- handling large equipment safely with good spatial awareness

Fine Motor skills:

 exploring and playing with small resources and tools e.g. puzzles, Lego, pegs, scissors...




The development of these skills helps to develop their early writing abilities.



The 4 Specific Areas

These are vital for igniting children's enthusiasm for learning and for building their capacity to learn.







The children will be learning to:

- develop a life long love of reading
- enjoy stories through being read to daily
- hear and say sounds, and link them to the alphabet
- read and write familiar words, phrases and sentences
- develop their understanding of stories and what they are reading







<u>Mathematics</u>

The children will be learning:


- To develop an understanding of maths through stories, song games and imaginative play
- Number skills a deep understanding of the numbers to 10, the relationship between them (one more/less) and the patterns within those numbers (number bonds up to 10)
- Counting, ordering, recording and recognising numbers beyond 10
- Visually recognising the total number of items in a group (subitising)
- Shape, Space and Measures 2D/ 3D shapes, patterns, measuring weight, length and capacity

Problem Solving – estimating, using and applying above skills.

<u>Understanding the World</u>

The children will:

- share and learn about themselves and others from the present and past
- explore and find out about the world around them, including places special to their community
- look at and use simple maps
- find out about different cultures and beliefs
- develop an interest in nature and learn about seasons
- compare different places, jobs and ways of life



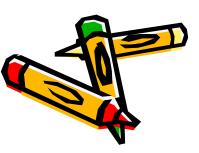




Expressive Arts and Design

The children will explore:

- colours and textures
- making things
- role play
- making music and singing songs
- dance





The first half term


We would have found out what the children already know, can do and choose to do and we use this information to inform our planning for each child.

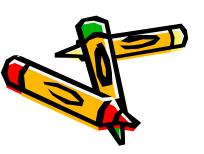
<u>Outdoor Learning</u>

Natural environments promote:

- co-ordination, balance and agility
- children's awareness, reasoning and observational skills
 social interaction between children

Outdoor learning:

- •supports concentration with more oxygen flowing around the body
- increases overall happiness and reduces stress levels
 all children tend to talk more outside –speaking up to 5
 times more often

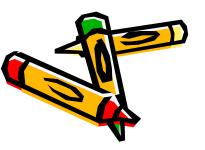

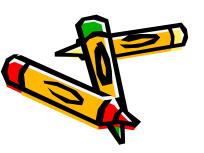
