

Keep reading every week at home and writing in your reading records! Have a go at the reading comprehension below;

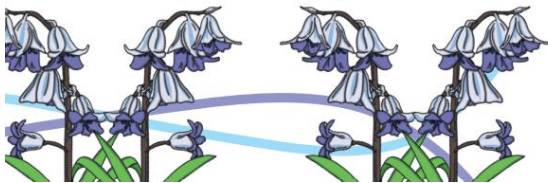
Bluebell Farm
